The Fund converted from a closed-end fund into an exchange-traded fund on October 24, 2016.

What does the ETF invest in?

The ETF seeks to provide holders of Class B Unhedged Units with (i) the opportunity for capital appreciation; (ii) monthly cash distributions; and (iii) lower overall volatility of Portfolio returns than would otherwise be experienced by owning Equity Securities of the Energy Leaders directly. To achieve lower overall volatility of portfolio returns, the ETF will generally write covered call options on up to 33% of the portfolio securities. The level of covered call option writing may vary based on market volatility and other factors. The value of the portfolio attributable to the Class B Unhedged Units, if any, will not be currency hedged.

Market price		There are two main options for placing trades: market orders and limit orders. A market order lets you buy or sell units at the current market price.				
 ETFs are bought and sold on exchanges at the market price. The market price can change throughout the trading day. Factors like supply, demand, and changes in the value of the ETF's investments can affect the market price. You can get price quotes any time during the trading day. Quotes have two parts: bid and ask. 	A limit order lets you set a price at which you are willing to buy or sell units. Timing In general, market prices of ETFs can be more volatile around the start and end of the trading day. Consider using a limit order or placing a trade at another time during the trading day.					
 The bid is the highest price a buyer is willing to pay if you want to sell your ETF units. The ask is the lowest price a seller is willing to accept if you want to buy ETF units. The difference between the two is called the "bid-ask spread". In general, a smaller bid-ask spread means the ETF is more liquid. That means you are more likely to get the price you expect.

How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the ETF in a registered plan such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan, or a Tax-Free Savings Account. Keep in mind that if you hold your ETF in a non-registered account, distributions from the ETF are included in your taxable income, whether you get them in cash or have them reinvested.					

How much does it cost?

This section shows the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Class B Unhedged Units of the ETF. Fees and expenses – including trailing commissions - can vary among ETFs. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other ETFs and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. Brokerage Commissions

You may have to pay a commission every time you buy and sell Class B Unhedged Units of the ETF. Commissions may vary by brokerage firm. Some brokerage firms may offer commission-free ETFs or require a minimum purchase amount.

2. ETF expenses

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the ETF's returns. The ETF's expenses are made up of the management fee, operating expenses and trading costs. The ETF's annual management fee is 0.85% of the ETF's value. As this class is new, operating expenses and trading costs are not yet available.

3. Trailing commission

A trailing commission is an ongoing commission. It is paid for as long as you own the ETF. It is for the services and advice that your representative and their firm provide to you. This ETF doesn't have a trailing commission.

Other Fee:	The Manager may charge exchanging or redeeming Unitholders of the Harvest ETFs, at its discretion, a fee of up to 2% of the exchange or redemption proceeds to offset certain transaction costs associated with the exchange or redemption of Class B Unhedged Units. The Manager will publish the fee, if any, on its website, www.harvestportfolios.com.
	The fee will not be charged to a Unitholder in connection with the buying or selling of Class B Unhedged Units on the TSX.

What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the prospectus, ETF facts or financial statements contain a misrepresentation.
